I recently attended the annual AAFP FMX meeting in Chicago. As is always the case when I attend that meeting, I get to be reacquainted with a number of graduates of the program, many of whom I have not seen since their graduation. It gives me a sense of pride to see the number of quality Family Physicians that have trained in our program.

Going to the meeting also reminds me of Dr. Tom Nicholas, the founding Chair of our department and residency. The year after I joined the faculty, the annual AAFP meeting was in Kan-

sas City. While there, I ran into Tom. We were on our way to a meeting, but we arrived very late. The reason for our tardiness was that we could not go 10 steps <u>without</u> another physician at the meeting seeing Tom, coming over to greet him and thank him for his help, wanting to have a few moments of time with one of the founding fathers of our specialty.

Tom grew up in Wyoming. After college he served as a navigator in WW II on bombers (SOOOO many stories about that; no GPS then, navigated by stars). After the war he went to medical school at the University of Colorado and then went to Buffalo, Wyoming where he spent 25 years in General Practice. In the mid 60's when the specialty was morphing into Family Medicine with a three-year residency, Dr. Nicholas was one of the key "movers and shakers". He eventually left private practice, working at several university locations helping start residency programs—in his career he founded 3 residency programs and consulted on many more. He took a job at the AAFP as the Director of the Division of Education which brought him to Kansas City. The leaders of UMKC approached him about establishing a program and a residency. He eventually accepted the job, with the stipulation the residency would be located at Tru-



man Medical Center-East (now University Health-Lakewood Medical Center.) The first residents entered the program in 1980 and now there are well over 400 graduates of the program. Quite a legacy. During his years as Chair of our Department (1978-1989) he was active nationally, serving as Chairman of the American Board of Family Medicine, President of the Association of Departments of Family Medicine, and a lot of activity in the AAFP and Society

of Teachers of Family Medicine. After retiring from the Chair position, he continued to be active nationally and to teach residents—he had a special interest in dermatology, and trained the residents and other faculty in diagnosis and procedures.

After he "really" retired, a foundation was created for the department in his honor—The Nicholas Family Medicine Society. It is dedicated to the professional development of its members and the support of the Residency, Fellowships, and other training programs of the Department of Community and Family Medicine at UMKC. I would ask you consider a contribution to the Nicholas Family Medicine Society to help insure continuation of Dr. Nicholas' legacy.

In Appreciation



After 39 years with University Health, formerly Truman Medical Center, Dr. Steve Griffith has retired. He has been with the Department of Community and Family Medicine at UMKC School of Medicine since 1984. Initially he worked in the rural office of the Department, then became Program Director of the residency in 1989. He held the position of Associate Chair from 1998 until he became Chair of the Department in 2001. Dr. Griffith says what attracted him to our hospital was that it is a primary care hospital with one residency that trains residents in the full spectrum of Family Medicine. This created a sense of camaraderie that has existed since the inception of the program. The mission to care for all patients regardless of ability to pay and it continues to make this a great place to be. Dr. Griffith educated and mentored many, many residents over the years, provided many hours of personalized health care to his patients, and is highly appreciated by staff as well.

Jon Dedon, MD hung up his stethoscope at the end of July after 32 years of service at University Health. Dr. Dedon was the medical director for the University Health Lakewood Care Center as well as the section leader for the Geriatric Medicine program at the UMKC School of Medicine Family Medicine Department and the program director and founder of the UMKC School of Medicine Family Medicine Department's Geriatric Medicine Fellowship, which has trained more than 50 fellows in geriatric medicine over the past 25 years. He has been the trusted physician to many UH Lakewood Care Center patients and a respected educator/mentor to medical students, residents, and fellows as well as staff and colleagues.



In Memoriam



With his passing, we honor Dr. Bruno Zwerenz, MD and his many years of service.

Dr. Zwerenz retired from the UMKCSOM Department of Community and Family Medicine in 2016 where he was an Associate Professor and had served as Chief Behavioral Science Section from 1982 until his retirement.

Dr. Zwerenz completed residency at the University of Missouri-Kansas City Department of Psychiatry, Western SMissouri Mental Health Center in 1969 and was board certified by the American Board of Psychiatry and Neurology. He joined the General Hospital, now University Health, Medical Staff in 1969 and was a member for 53 years!

He served as UMKCSOM Docent for the Year 1 students for many years. He taught countless family medicine residents/fellows as well as residents from other disciplines. In his role in our department/residency program he was at the forefront of teaching clinical and therapeutic aspects of psychiatry in the setting of family and community medicine. Just as importantly Dr. Zwerenz served the mental health needs for thousands of patients over decades throughout Jackson County, MO and beyond, providing psychiatric care to many who otherwise might not have had access.

Many of us know Dr. Bruno as one half of the amazing Drs. Rose and Bruno Zwerenz combo. In fact they have been married 54 years! Together they have been a vibrant, inspiring academic medicine couple and fully lived human-beings. Our hearts are heavy and we send our love and support to Rose and her family.

Dr. Zwerenz will be remembered as one of the pillars of our department, UMKC SOM and our hospital system.
